

Principal's Message:

I have been married for fifteen years now. It's an adventure I wouldn't trade in for anything. Nobody gets me the way my wife does. Rebekah is an interior designer. She studied at Harrington Institute of Interior Design in Chicago. I didn't realize when I married her that, no matter what home we lived in, there would always be a project happening. I blame Chip and Joanna Gaines along with all of HGTV. But not one time have we ever put up shiplap.

I did not grow up around tools nor was my father a handyman. However, I have come to really enjoy working on projects. The process of solving complex problems while working with your hands gives me a lot of satisfaction. Starting out, our projects were born out of necessity. Rebekah and I didn't have a lot of money. Our first home was a small, two bedroom, one and a half story that we bought for 75K. You could do that in Elkhart during the recession. I was teaching and coaching while Rebekah was home with our infant girls. If we wanted to update our home then it was up to us to put in the labor. Project by project we gained experience. Project by project we added value to our homes.

So much of my day is having conversations, working from a computer, shepherding 800 students to the next class every 45 minutes. Using some power tools to hang a level shelf is the kind of instant gratification I'm looking for. The point of all of this being that everytime we rev up a project, I'm reminded that I love project based learning, and I'm not alone.

Every weekend I see men and women working on their lawns, homes, and vehicles. I can hear the tools. I can see the progress. It's a good reminder that our students are not made to sit at desks all day long. Reading, Writing, and Math are vital to a good education, but they all blend together with Project Based Learning. I never thought I would read so much about Indiana building codes for drains and P-traps. But that's the research you have to do if you want your laundry room in a different space. You need math to figure out a ¼ inch of downward slope per foot on a drain pipe.

I want to take this time to highlight our teachers who provide opportunities for students to learn kinesthetically. Mr. McGoldrick who teaches Project Lead the Way (PLTW). Ms. Grimler who teaches art. Mr. Lewis who directs our band along with Mrs. Marsh who directs our choir. All of Grimmer's Science Department: Mr. Meyer, Ms. Mullaney, Mrs. Alcazar, Mrs. George, Mrs. Bortko, Mrs. Duncan, and Ms. Calhoun. These classes play an important role in students applying math and reading in order to build and create. Even this week our 6th graders are visiting the Challenger Learning Center.

I also want to highlight the shortage of skilled trade workers in our country right now. You can make some great money as a welder, electrician, plumber or carpenter. Not only do the trades pay well, they give you a skill you can use the rest of your life.

I'm reminded of my childhood friend Nick who dreamed of becoming a pastor. There is nothing cheap about seminary school nor is there anything lucrative about being a pastor afterwards. I watched Nick (at the age of 14) push a lawnmower up and down his neighborhood so he could eventually save up and buy a truck. He then got the truck, a trailer, and a commercial mower. Nick's been a pastor for twenty years. He walked out of seminary debt free along with a successful mowing company. There's plenty of opportunity out there, and we aim to provide hands-on experience in order to show students that opportunity.
